Dear Grade 6 Students and Parents/Guardians:

As National Fire Prevention Month comes to a close, the Cranford Public Schools would like to support and encourage further fire prevention and fire safety conversations with our 6th grade students and their families. In partnership with the Cranford Fire Department, we are integrating the "Fire is" video series into our sixth grade science classes. We request that all 6th grade students view the series of "Fire is" videos, a realistic and informative program developed by Dr. Frank Field, at home with their parents. Each video runs approximately 20 minutes. One video will be assigned each month as follows:

- "Fire is Black" in November
- "Fire is Hot" in December
- "Fire is Fast" in January
- "Fire is Smoke and Gas" in February
- "Fire is an Emergency" in March

In addition to viewing the videos, the 6th grade science teachers will facilitate short lessons, activities and discussions to reinforce important facts and concepts. Each student will be asked to complete a pre/post test survey. The FMBA will use the results of the assessments to evaluate the effectiveness of the program.

As Superintendent of Schools in Cranford, New Jersey, it is an honor to voice my support for an exciting educational fire awareness and prevention program entitled "Fire Is." This program, now in its second year of implementation in Cranford, represents a very collaborative partnership between the Cranford Public Schools and the Cranford Fire Department.

This relatively new initiative was brought to our attention by Cranford Firefighter, Andrew Stratton. For both personal and professional reasons, Lieutenant Stratton and Dr. Frank Field have dedicated themselves to ensure that children and adults are familiar with the real-world dangers of fire and the misconceptions of fire as portrayed on television.

The "Fire Is" series was first implemented in Cranford in 2009 and made available to all of our 5th and 6th grade students and their parents on the Cranford Public Schools local television channel and on our district website during Fire Prevention Week. Parents and their children were asked to watch as many of the five 20 minute lessons with their children as possible. The district presented all five lessons one day at a time during Fire Prevention week. Each of the lessons: *Fire is Black; Fire is Hot; Fire is Fast; Fire is Smoke and Gas*; and *Fire is an Emergency* are vivid and highly engaging. Over this five period of five days our "Fire Is" website link had over 7000 hits!

By utilizing the website and public television access, our Cranford educational program was enhanced and critical life-saving information was communicated to our students and community members. Furthermore, parents and their children watched the assignment together, thus teaching two generations realistic fire and life safety education at the same time. Surveys regarding the program's impact were sent home with a return rate of approximately 30 percent. All responses contained very positive comments.

In 2010, Cranford continued this fire prevention partnership by now linking our school district website to the new "Fire Is" website. One "Fire Is" module was assigned to our students per month in accordance with NJ State Law regarding regular instruction in fire and life safety.

It is our hope that by cooperating with the Cranford Fire Department and Dr. Frank Field our school family and community members will be kept safe if ever confronted with such a danger.

This is a wonderful program. I fully endorse the "Fire Is" series as a safety lesson for all ages and encourage other school districts to take advantage of its accessibility and potential life-saving message.

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'Fire Is...' Educational DVD Enters N.J. Schools

Program launched during Fire Prevention Week.

In March 2006, a "Fire Is..." DVD arrived in mailboxes across the country glued to the pages of *Firehouse Magazine*. This fire education DVD, brought to you by Dr. Frank Field in cooperation with MetLife, met with great success and much positive feedback. Now it has expanded to the entire New Jersey school system, beginning this week in Cranford, N.J.

"We were able to secure a grant from the State Office of Homeland Security & Preparedness to the NJFMBA Fire Safety Foundation and get 'Fire Is..." to be a state-wide program," says Dr. Field, former meteorologist and science editor. "Cranford debuts 'Fire Is...Black' during Fire Prevention week and will continue with one lesson at a time."

Most fire education in this country is directed at elementary school students, primarily to young children who color pictures and learn to "stop, drop and roll." The middle school students in 5th, 6th, and 7th grades are not taught the truth - that fire is not fun. "Fire Is..." Identifies fire as dangerous and shows what can happen when children are burned or killed in a blaze.

Beginning with Fire Is Black, Cranford students will see each module including Fire Is Hot, Fire is Smoke and Gas, Fire Is Fast and Fire Is An Emergency. Each segment is designed so that children are not overwhelmed...but children aren't the only goal here.

"The school district will be sending a survey to all the parents via e-mail and there is a school assignment letter that we ask them to fill out at home, noting whether the parent and child or just the child viewed the video lesson. We want to educate parents at the same time," explains Dr. Field. "We will be following up to get the data on how many viewed it and their remarks to perform a study with the kind of information we need to see how effective it is."

The videos can be view on local public-access stations, totaling 170 for the state, on www.fireis.com and www.nifiresafety.com.

Learning and Growing

After testing the DVD in several sites nationwide last year, Dr. Field structured this year's program around the feedback he received. Grand Island, NE, Fire Department participated and found that it was not only good for the kids to be informed of the seriousness of fires, but it was an eye opener for educators as well.

"I felt that after I showed these videos, teachers were more interested in being involved in fire prevention education, something that all the other curtsy, comic, and 'fun' educational materials, as well as state law, has never done," says Fred Hotz, fire/EMS administration chief.

The DVD was not without criticism. Some teachers conveyed to their principals that they felt uncomfortable with the graphic content, though Grand Island showed the video to students in grades 1-5. Each grade viewed one part of the series based on age appropriateness.

Dr. Field is happy with the results and feels that older children need to be aware of the danger of fire. "At this age, children can begin to understand that, yes, you can burn down an entire building with a single match. In the video, you will see children respond to the question of how many matches does it take to burn down this big building down? The responses range from thousands to 500 to 200."

Lesson learned: fire education is an essential part of fire safety.
